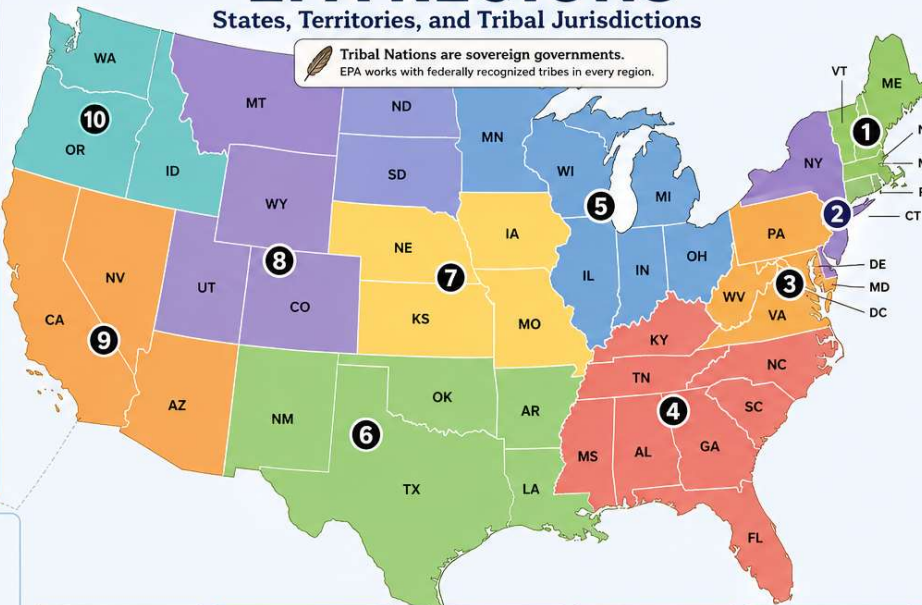

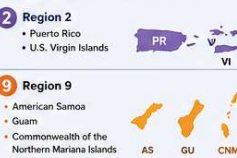

U.S. TERRITORIES BY REGION

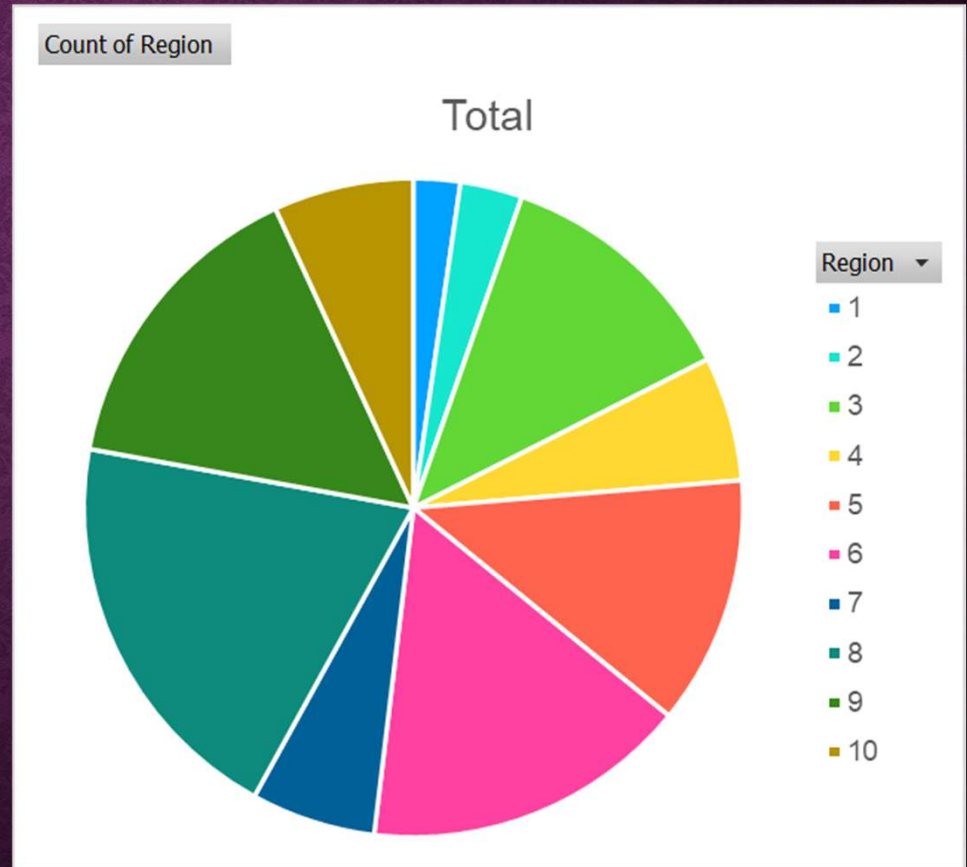


Tribal Nations are present in every EPA region.

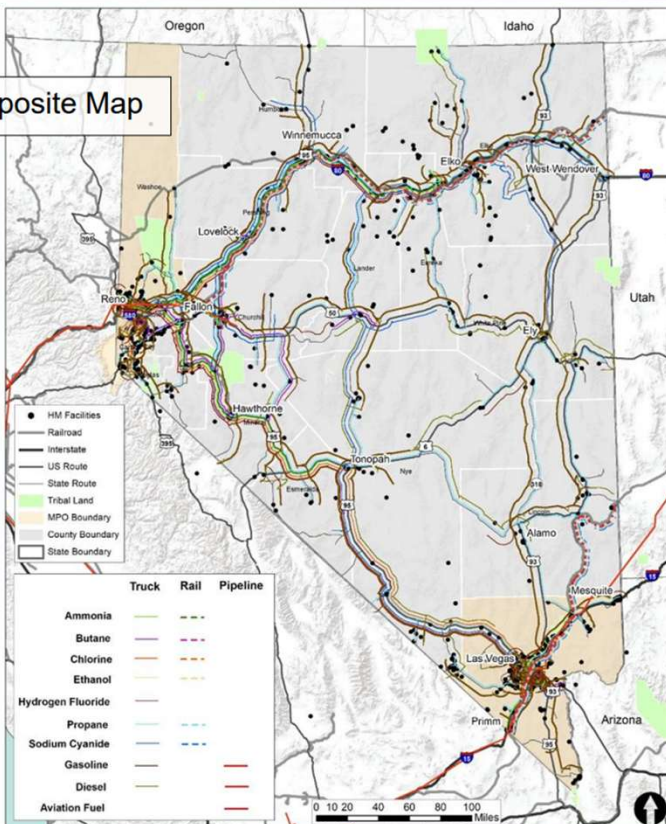

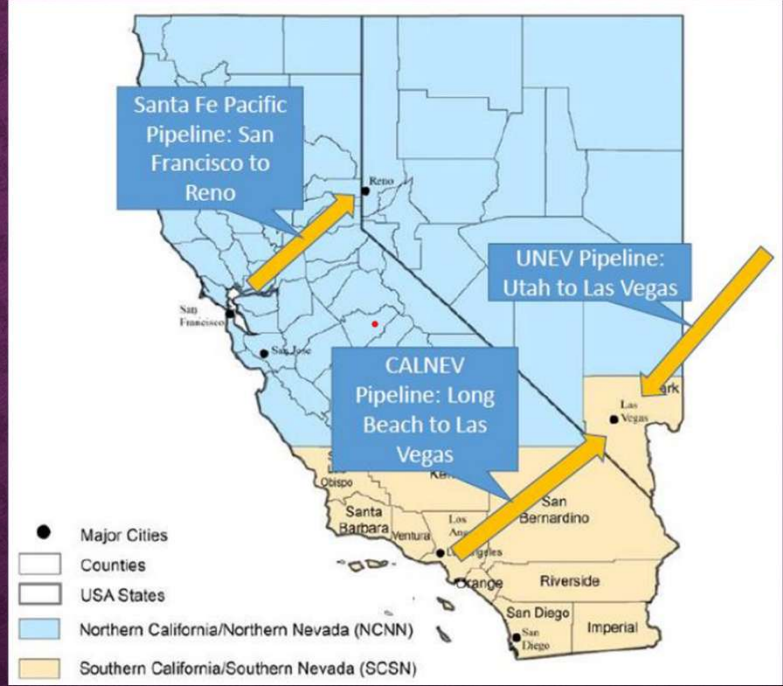


A.3.8. MHAFB AOR Map

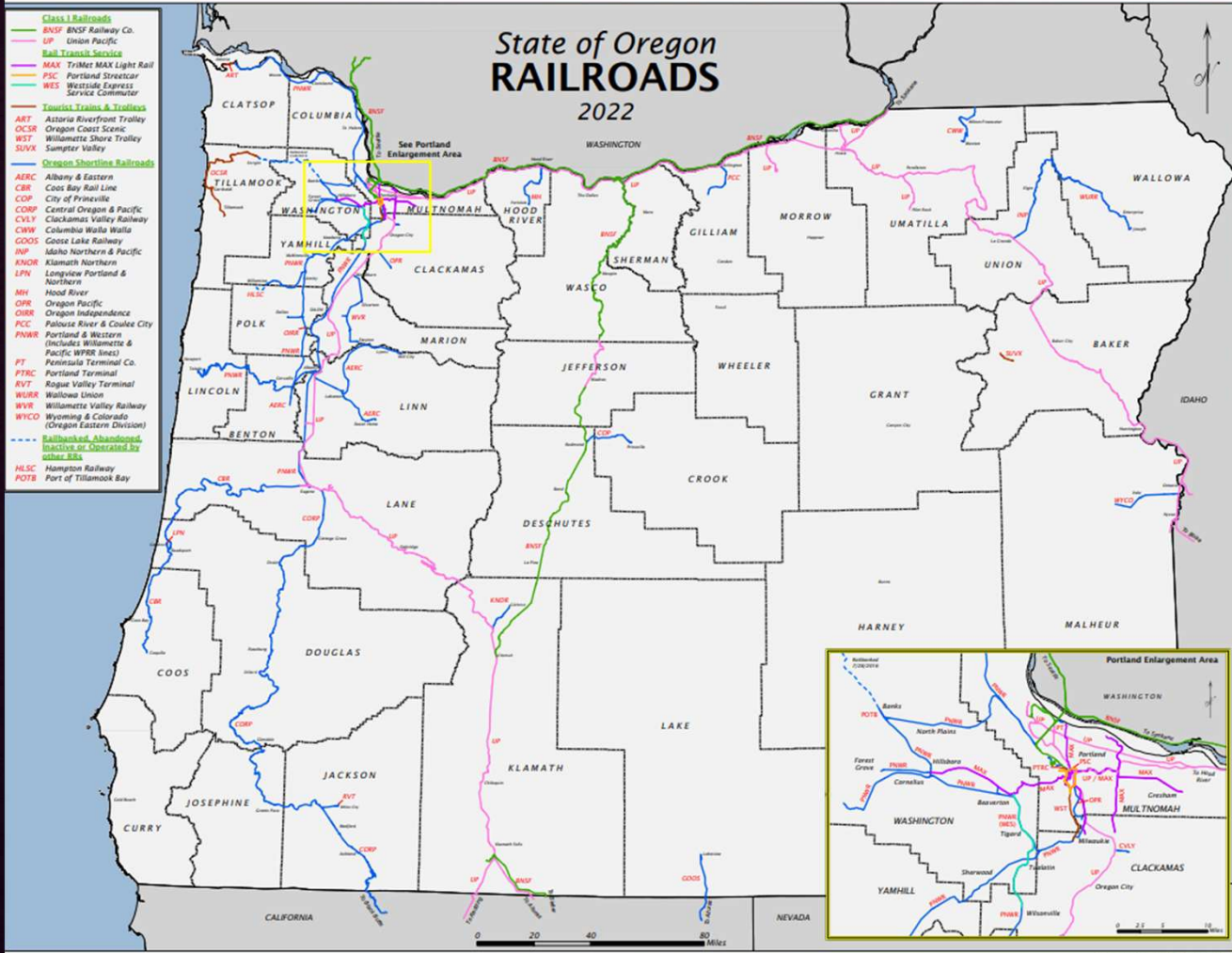

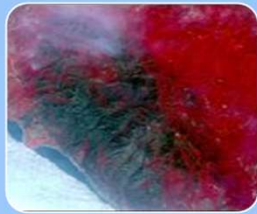

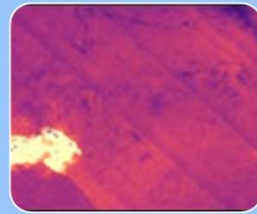
